



Letter From The Chief

The DeKalb Police Department witnessed 2010 crime and accident trends that reflected those experienced throughout many parts of the United States. Less crime, fewer accidents, more violence that is newsworthy, gangs, guns and drugs. DeKalb experienced a 10% drop in Part I crimes (used to calculate FBI issued crime rate) and a 13% decline in Part II crimes. (See page 37 for details).

The Antinette “Toni” Keller homicide, a drug-induced homicide, an increase in aggravated battery cases, weapon cases, cannabis and controlled substance cases grabbed headlines and raised community fears. Successful investigations and aggressive patrol tactics also broadcast a message that DeKalb will not tolerate violence, and this department will aggressively pursue violent offenders, gangs and those who destroy lives by the sale of drugs.

Outstanding professional efforts by patrol officers and investigators have resulted in many successful arrests. Pro-active measures have increased to produce and utilize local and regional intelligence to pursue offenders. A joint effort with NIU Police to increase police patrols in the northwest section of town was initiated.

Additional officers and a large police facility in a strategic location will help us in our effort to be effective and efficient in keeping the community safe.

The police department’s new radio communications system was placed in operation. The new system not only increases the quality and reliability of the radio communications, but also enhances our statewide interoperability capability. At the same time the dispatch center was expanded to increase call capacity.

City budget reductions during the severe recession has impacted the department. Three police officer positions are still unfilled. Two valued members of our support

staff, Judy Latimer and Debra Ormond, were part of the city workforce reductions and are missed.

Three members of the department retired in 2010. I would like to extend my heartfelt thanks to Officers Tim Moore and Dick Zenzen and Telecommunicator Jean Sandman for their many years of service – their combined years of service is 101 years.





- ILEAS grant was used for Intelligence Officer training and received laptop, printer and camera.




ADMINISTRATION DIVISION

The Administrative Division duties include records management, mandated reporting to various governmental bodies, purchasing, budget preparation and oversight, payroll, clerical support, facilities management, infectious materials and data processing. Other duties carried out by Administration include making major purchases, as well as daily department purchases, assist DeKalb County Youth Service Bureau with their auction of city donated property, handling subpoena and Freedom of Information Act requests, handling day time walk ins, maintaining website, registering sex offenders, and other miscellaneous duties. The community service officer's duties are to log, track and maintain evidence for the department.

Some of this year's highlights were:

Chief Feithen continues to be a member of the E911 Board, Illinois Association of Chief of Police Legislative Committee, Illinois Law Enforcement Alarm System, Mobile Training Unit Division 2, Illinois Association Chiefs of Police and International Association Chiefs of Police, a member of the North Central Narcotics Task Force policy board, and on the Illinois LEADS (Law Enforcement Agency Data Systems) policy board.

Lt. Hoadley is a member of the Northern Chapter of the FBI National Academy and holds the office of 2nd Vice President, as well as Secretary/Treasurer of the DeKalb County Law Enforcement Executive Association, a member of the Illinois Crime Analysts, International Chiefs of Police and serves on the board for the Mobile Training Unit. Sgt. Smith is a member of the Sungard H.T.E. User Group and will serve again as president of the Midwest division of the user group and serves as vice president on the DeKalb Police Pension Board, as well as on the PrairieShield executive committee. Penny Meier continues to be a member of the Sungard H.T.E. Users Group and the Illinois Crime Analysts organization.

The division continues to perform LiveScan electronic fingerprinting for citizens. This service continues to be primarily performed on Thursdays by Officer McNett. Officer McNett also assists with maintenance and upgrades of the LiveScan machine, as well as for the mobile data browsers. He also handles requests for copies of CDs of the in-car videos and 911 tapes.

Penny continues to maintain the Illinois Crime Analysts website. She also continued to work with the detective division and other area departments sending out intelligence reports on an almost daily basis and attending detective/gang meetings.

The police department continues their partnership with Complus Data Innovations, Inc.. Officers use the handheld computer ticket writers, provided to us by Complus, to issue parking citations. Citations are printed directly from these handheld computers onto thermal paper that will not rip, tear or smudge in any weather. The handhelds also enable the officers to select the appropriate citation information from drop-down menus, which reduces data entry errors.

Additionally, each handheld has a built-in camera so officers can capture an image of the violator's. With these capabilities, the handheld computer ticket writers have resulted in substantial error reduction, and overall increased productivity for the officers who use them.


ADMINISTRATION DIVISION cont'd

This past year the department received a grant from the DeKalb County Community Foundation allowing us to purchase two new squad car laptops. A grant from ILEAS was also received giving us five new squad car laptops. A grant from 3M allowed the department to purchase two laptops – one for the administration division and one for the investigative division.

This spring the dispatch center, conference room, and records room was remodeled. The conference room now resides where the old dispatch center was; the dispatch center is now in the old conference room; and the records room was expanded by removing the vestibule, painted, and carpeted. A bullet proof window and door was installed that leads into the records area. Also, the file cabinets that housed the arrest jackets were removed – giving the room extra room. These records are being entered into a database on the City's server.

This past year the division also underwent personnel changes due to the first-ever layoffs within the City. The Administrative Division laid off one office assistant - Judy Latimer. Office Assistant Debra Ormond was laid off due to another AFSCME position being eliminated and bumping Ormond because of seniority rights. Office Assistant Rita Larson then transferred from Community Development. She is currently being trained in this position. Through the years the secretarial positions has decreased from four to three and now down to two. It should be noted that the workload has not decreased and therefore it is requiring the Lieutenant and Sergeant to assist in some of the duties once held by these positions.

Remodel...



This past year the dispatch center moved into the old conference room. Dispatchers continued to work through the remodel and looked forward to a slightly larger room – having bullet proof windows, four work stations, improved lighting, and new individual heating and air conditioning units. Construction started in the spring and was completed by the end of June.

The old dispatch center was renovated and it is now the department's conference room. The records area had a facelift – removing the vestibule, allowing a workstation to be aligned with the front bullet proof window, installing a bullet proof door, and removing the old file cabinets that held the arrest jackets. The information from the old arrest jackets are being entered into a database – allowing these to be paperless.

COMMUNICATIONS DIVISION

The Communications Division is responsible for answering 9-1-1 emergency calls, all non-emergency calls, and informational calls on a 24-hour basis. The Division provides 24-hour dispatch and communications support to the DeKalb Police and DeKalb Fire Departments. The Division also monitors the radio traffic of the Public Works Division and acts as a backup dispatch center for Division VI of the fire service MABAS (Mutual Aid Box Alarm System).

The primary function of the Communications Division is to receive, prioritize and assign calls for service to both the DeKalb Police and Fire Departments. The Division assists the officers and firefighters by gathering information from the State computer system and our own computer database. The Telecommunicators also assist citizens in resolving problems that do not necessitate Police or Fire response.

The division enters data into the Computer Aided Dispatch (CAD) system and into the Records Management Systems (RMS). All telecommunicators are certified in Emergency Medical Dispatch (EMD) and all are certified through the State of Illinois to access the state database. EMD training enables the telecommunicators to give callers instructions in CPR, childbirth, how to control bleeding etc.

The Communications Division consists of ten full time telecommunicators and three part time telecommunicators (TC's). All of the TC's participate in monthly in-house training, as well as completing their state required recertifications.

In 2010, the Telecommunicators entered 42,029 police calls, 5,041 fire/ambulance calls, and answered over 14,000 911 calls.

This year, the Communications Division moved into their new room. The construction phase was very chaotic, but it moved along quickly. The new room was done and ready to move in on June 23rd. Ironically, as the computers were getting hooked up, severe weather struck the area and within minutes of a piece of equipment being plugged in, the tornado sirens had to be set off. With the new room two new ergonomic desks were added - having a total of four workstations. The grant from PrairieShield brought us three new Motorola dispatch consoles and a move to the Starcom radio system.

TC Jean Sandman retired in July of 2010 after 34 years of dispatch service. TC Adrienne Oziah went from full-time to part-time and TC Jill Meyer took the full-time slot.

Two awards were given this year. In July, TC Meyer received a call of a two year old child choking on a grape and not breathing. Through the telecommunicator's clear instruction, she was able to talk the parents through the Heimlich. The grape was then dislodged and the child started breathing again. In December, TC Zenzen received a call of a woman about to give birth. TC Zenzen sent the ambulance and assisted the father in the delivery of his baby girl.

INVESTIGATIONS DIVISION

The Investigations Division consists of one lieutenant, one sergeant, six investigative detectives, one detective/SRO (School Resource Officer) and one SRO. One detective has the responsibility of developing and presenting crime prevention programs to senior citizens and the general public.

The detectives' primary responsibilities are: investigating general criminal cases requiring follow-up investigations; major criminal offenses assigned directly to the division; assist the Liquor Commissioner in investigating liquor license applicants; gathering information concerning street gangs operating within the city; and background investigations of police applicants.

The duty of the school resource officers is to handle the majority of complaints requiring police action in the schools and they interact with students and staff on non-criminal matters. They

also have the responsibility to investigate criminal offenses committed by juveniles who are referred to the division and make

determinations as to their dispositions and referrals. They also investigate abuse cases committed against juveniles.

The gang unit, comprised of two officers, is responsible for overt patrol tactics designed for crime prevention and intervention, criminal intelligence, surveillance activities, and diversion techniques. They also teach gang awareness training to school officials, parents, and community groups, as well as give diversion techniques to prevent juvenile involvement in gang activity

The Investigation Division worked several drugs cases this past year due to a notable increase in the presence of drugs – particularly heroin. *See Noteworthy Cases for cases resulting in arrests.

The division handled 719 cases with 53% of the cases resulting in arrest; 10% cleared exceptionally; 17% inactive; 14% pending; 1% unfounded and 5% referred to another agency.

This past year a nationally recognized homicide case occurred in Prairie Park. The victim was a NIU student, Antinette "Toni" Keller, was reported as missing. Numerous hours of investigation resulted in the arrest of Billy Curl, who was apprehended in Louisiana. Much appreciation is due to the agencies that assisted in the investigation, as well as to NIU for the use of their facilities and for their assistance with handling the media coverage. Due to this heinous crime, investigators worked around the clock to solve this crime – giving the citizens and students their sense of security back. *See noteworthy cases for further details in this case.



JUVENILE INVESTIGATIONS

The purpose of the Illinois Juvenile Court Act is to secure for each minor such care and guidance as will serve the safety, moral, emotional, mental, and physical welfare of the minor and the best interests of the community, including preserving and strengthening the minor's family ties whenever possible. With this in mind, the juvenile officer uses these criteria when determining how to handle each situation. The juvenile officer has several options available to them, depending upon the individual situation that presents itself. These include informal and formal station adjustments, referrals to the Youth Service Bureau, Ben Gordon Mental Health Center or the Department of Children and Family Services. In special circumstances suggestions for outside private counseling may be offered. The decisions are based upon consideration for the welfare of the youth and the individual family circumstances, as well as the benefits to our community as a whole.

During 2010 the DeKalb police department arrested 355 juvenile offenders for a total of 418 charges. From these arrests, there were 15 formal station adjustments; 121 informal station adjustments; 198 referred to juvenile court; and 84 referred to city court.

PATROL DIVISION

The Patrol Division has traditionally been known as the “backbone” of the department providing 24- hour coverage to the City of DeKalb. The division is divided into three sections: Patrol, School Crossing Guards, and Community Service Officers (CSO's). Authorized to consist of one lieutenant, six sergeants, four corporals, and 33 patrol officers, one officer is assigned to the administration division half of his shift. The department has three additional patrol officers assigned to investigations.

Patrol officers are assigned to one of three shifts. To address shortages in manpower due to military reserve duty, retirement, resignation, injury, and illness with a city-wide hiring freeze in place, the officers work 10-hour shifts. This has made it possible to have more officers available during peak times. There are still times when this is not enough manpower and we thank our neighboring departments for their assistance.

Five sergeants and four corporals supervise the shifts. An additional sergeant serves as an administrative assistant to the patrol lieutenant, as well as being assigned to other duties and may supervise a shift when the other shift supervisors are not available. The sergeants rotate through the administrative assistant position. Sergeants Haacker, Costliow, Petragallo, and Petit were the road sergeants in 2010. Sergeant McDougall went to the road from the administrative assistant position and Sgt. Leverton began serving as the administrative assistant to the patrol lieutenant.

In addition to their supervisory duties, some sergeants have additional responsibilities. Sergeant Leverton works on the policy writing for the department. He coordinates the Volunteer program and the Field Training program. Sergeant Leverton maintains the department's automated external defibrillators (AED's) and is a certified instructor - training department personnel in the use of AED's. As the patrol administrative assistant, he works on countless projects.

Sergeant Haacker is a certified range instructor. He manages the department range program and coordinates annual qualifications for handgun, shot gun, and rifle use. He also is a state certified school crossing guard instructor.

Sergeant Petit supervises the Bike Patrol. Having attended an 80-hour course on the identification and testing of marijuana, he is also state certified to test cannabis taken in evidence and identify it for court purposes. This saves time and energy as the department no longer needs to send marijuana to the state lab. Testing fees ordered by the court now go to the City of DeKalb instead of the State of Illinois. The old shredding/storage room, once a photo lab, has been turned into a marijuana identification lab. The room also doubles as an office for the community service officers.

Sergeant Costliow maintains DUI equipment such as the breathalyzer and portable breath test (PBT's). The old PBT's are being supplemented with Alco-Sensor FST Portable Breath Tester. The FST are new portable breath testers that will eventually replace the old PBT's. Sgt. Costliow handled the training for the new devices.

Sergeant Petragallo is the department liaison to the local homeless shelter. He has had a seat on the Hope Haven board for several years.

Sergeant McDougall serves as the coordinator of the DeKalb Police Department Motor Unit. He also sets up the Roadside Safety Checks throughout the year. While assigned as the patrol administrative assistant, Sergeant McDougall worked on a host of other projects as well.



PATROL DIVISION cont...

The administrative assistant to the patrol lieutenant title is a misnomer. Those assigned to this position perform a myriad of functions. The main thrust of this position is to free up time normally spent by the patrol lieutenant, the administrative lieutenant, and the administrative sergeant. The administrative assistant also supervises a shift one day a week and fills in for other sergeants as necessary. The position includes duties that at one time were assigned to patrol sergeants giving them more time to supervise on the street level. Duties include coordinating court security, school crossing guards, and the Chief's Challenge. He serves as the training coordinator for the department and manages the Citizen Radar program as well.

Corporals Biarnesen, Tehan, Espy, and Farrell assist the sergeants and serve as shift commanders in the absence of a sergeant. They too wear more than one hat. Corporal Biarnesen handles tobacco compliance checks and TIPS training. Corporal Tehan assists on the range and is a certified taser instructor. Corporal Espy runs the taser program and liaisons with Target Corporation to make the annual National Night Out a success. Corporal Farrell manages the child seat technicians and is in charge of the overweight truck details.



The DeKalb Police Department patrols the city in a variety of ways. Police can be seen in the neighborhoods walking on foot or riding on bicycles. Motorcycles, as well as the traditional squad cars, are also used. Nick, the department K-9, also assisted in keeping the citizens of DeKalb safe.

2010 proved to be another busy year for those in the patrol division. We continued with conducting roadside safety checks, some in conjunction with Illinois State Police, at various locations and times throughout the year. The roadside safety checks proved to be a very positive operation targeting unlicensed drivers, non-insured motorists, those driving under the influence, occupants not seat belted and unregistered motor vehicles. Hundreds of motorists were checked but only a small number were issued citations. Most citations were for non-compliance of insurance and seat belt laws.

The police department continued to supplement a traffic unit with an IDOT grant. One of only two given in the state, the efforts of officers working under past grants made it possible for the city of DeKalb to receive the monies. The grant allowed for the hire back of police officers trained in accident investigation through various schools such as the Northwestern University Center for Public Safety to be assigned to high accident road segments throughout the city to enforce traffic law. This grant was a boom for our community as it provides for traffic safety at times when we need to pull our normal traffic car to handle calls or cover short shifts. Unfortunately, the three year grant ended in 2010.

Specially trained officers weighed trucks along the roadside using portable scales. Officers set up at a location and weigh all semi-trucks, as well as larger straight trucks. As the scales are portable, officers can change locations throughout the day concentrating on trouble spots as they arise.

Realizing the importance of keeping tobacco out of the hands of our youth, with the aide of monies from a grant disbursed through the Illinois Liquor Control Commission, all tobacco licensees were checked to make sure they complied with laws prohibiting the sale of cigarettes to minors.

Education is just as necessary as enforcement. The DeKalb Police Department provides training to alcohol servers. Corporal Biarnesen heads a team of four officers certified in Training for Intervention Procedures (TIPS). They train liquor establishment employees in acceptable standards of practice for the service of alcohol.

PATROL DIVISION cont...

In hopes of fostering good relationship with the community the Patrol Division continues both the foot patrol program and the resident officer program. These programs take aim assisting in non-police matters and problem solving neighborhood troubles as well as criminal matters. The take home car project increases police visibility in neighborhoods as well. Officers certified as child passenger safety seat technicians continued installing seats. More about the above mentioned programs can be found throughout this report.



COMMUNITY SERVICE OFFICER

In 2002 the DeKalb Police Department began a Community Service Officers (CSO) program. CSO Faivre was hired to assist sworn officers. At the time, recently retired from the Secretary of State office, CSO Faivre's talents were put to work on abandoned vehicles, issues relating with vehicle codes, and other non-hazardous duties. Over the years two more CSOs were hired – giving us three Community Service Officers. The CSOs are all non-sworn part-time civilian members of the Police Department responsible for various functions within the department. They were hired to do duties that they have special talents for, as well continuing to assist sworn officers by performing non-hazardous law enforcement duties that had traditionally been handled by sworn officers. Though still willing to provide a vast array of services to the community, sworn officers now have the opportunity to concentrate their efforts on more serious problems.

SCHOOL CROSSING GUARDS

School crossing guards are trained by Sgt. Jason Leverton and Sgt. James Haacker on legal issues and proper procedures each year before school starts. There are 17 adult crossing guards at 18 school crossings throughout the city. There are also four substitutes available when the regular guard is not able to work for any reason. Sgt. Leverton is in charge of the crossing guard program.

SPECIAL UNITS

BIKE PATROL

The DeKalb Police Department established a bike patrol unit in 2001. The Bike Patrol unit is an invaluable tool for getting officers into the community. The Bike Patrol continues to patrol DeKalb at all hours of the day and in all neighborhoods.

In 2010 the Bike Patrol consisted of five patrol officers and one school liaison officer. The Bike Patrol increased its hours on the south side of DeKalb, up 92% from 2009. They have also increased hours in the northeast part of DeKalb - up 41% from 2009. The hours spent in the campus area was consistent with 2009 - up only 7%.

SPECIAL UNITS

CANINE UNIT

The DeKalb Police Department K-9 Unit was founded in 2006 with assistance from the North Central Narcotics Task Force. Officer Reilly is assigned to handle the canine. Nick is a seven year old German Shepherd born in Holland and imported to the United States via Canine Associates International. Officer Reilly and Nick went through training at the Canine Associates International training center, formerly of Leland, Illinois. Nick is a dual purpose drug detection/patrol dog – trained in narcotics detection, to include: cannabis, cocaine, crack cocaine, heroin, methamphetamine and ecstasy. Nick is also trained in handler protection, suspect apprehension, building and area searches, article searches and tracking. Nick works every shift with Officer Reilly and lives with him and his family. Nick and Officer Reilly continue with regular training and recertify regularly with the Illinois State Police. Nick continues to aid officers in locating narcotics and helps in difficult crowd situations.



GANG UNIT


The DeKalb Police Department implemented a gang unit in 2009 to combat the increase in gangs our city was experiencing. The unit is comprised of two officers who are assigned to the Investigations Division. Their duties include the following: overt patrol tactics designed for crime prevention and intervention, criminal intelligence, surveillance activities, diversion techniques to prevent juvenile involvement in gang activity, gang presentations to community groups, gang awareness training to school officials and parents, and follow-up gang related investigations. The goal of this unit is to utilize techniques to formulate a multi-faceted approach to identification, investigation, and prosecution of the gang members and their gangs that continue to commit crimes in our community.



MARIJUANA LEAF IDENTIFICATION

In December of 2009, Sergeant Tom Petit completed an 80 hour training course in Marijuana Leaf Identification. The course, offered by the Illinois Department of State Police Division of Forensic Services, is certified by the Illinois Local Government Law Enforcement Officer's Training Board. The training is the same as that given to State Forensic Scientists with regards to examining leafy material and identifying it as cannabis.

Sergeant Petit began testing submissions, exclusively from the DeKalb Police in January and analyzed over 250 items in 150+ cases in 2010. He was also deemed an expert witness with regards to Marijuana Leaf Identification by the DeKalb County Circuit Court.



The DeKalb Police Department is also eligible for any laboratory testing fees imposed on persons found guilty of associated criminal charges.

SPECIAL UNITS

MOTOR UNIT

The Motor Unit (motorcycles) was established in 2004. The focus of the motor unit is traffic enforcement and special events. It is also a tool the department uses to interact with the public, especially DeKalb's youths. The motorcycles are also able to patrol the miles of bike paths within the city and have been seen there many times over the past year.

Traffic enforcement occurs in high crash locations and in residential neighborhoods within the City. These locations chosen are areas where an officer in a marked police car would not be able to monitor traffic and take the necessary enforcement on traffic violations. Because of the unique characteristics of a motorcycle, its maneuverability, agility and size, officers have the ability to access many locations. Motorcycles offer the advantage of going places where a patrol car is unable to go.

Officers assigned to the Motorcycle Unit are known as "motormen". If selected to ride, the officer must successfully pass an 80-hour certified training program, which is put on by Northwestern University's Department of Public Safety and Harley-Davidson Motorcycles. The DeKalb Police Department currently has four Northwestern University certified officers. The motormen are Sgt. James McDougall, Officers Kevin Ferrigan, Keith Rominski and Lance Reinbolz.

The motorcycles are leased from Kutter Harley-Davidson in Janesville, Wisconsin. Each motorcycle is leased for a total of three years. The lease scales back the expenses of changing over equipment and striping new motorcycles annually. The motorcycles also help control fuel expenses.

In 2010, the motor unit logged nearly 1000 hours of patrol. The unit also participated in parades, CornFest, the CornFest 10K, and National Night Out.

Sgt. James McDougall is in charge of the DeKalb Police Department's Motorcycle Unit.



SPECIAL UNITS

TRAFFIC UNIT

The challenges of maintaining safe traffic movement on the roadways within our community continues to be a priority of the Patrol Division. In 2006 the DeKalb Police Department received a Traffic Law Enforcement Program (TLEP) Phase I grant from Illinois Department of Transportation, Division of Traffic Safety (IDOT/DTS) for the purpose of conducting research and training in creating a traffic safety unit as well as to ensure the ability to analyze crash data. Beginning in 2007 as a continuation of that program the DeKalb Police Department applied for and received the IDOT/DTS for a Traffic Law Enforcement Program (TLEP) Phase II grant. TLEP Phase II grant monies are for the purpose of traffic enforcement on specific high crash road segments.

The program was very successful. Since traffic enforcement throughout the city was spotty due to high call volumes and manpower issues, a decision was made to make a traffic car available to enforce traffic laws throughout the city. The traffic unit was not covered by a grant but made significant increases in visibility, enforcement, and addressing the concerns of citizens in the neighborhoods. The traffic unit worked rotating hours and rotating days off to provide coverage at a variety of times and in areas most needed. It also supplements the regular shifts during times of high emergency call volume or in covering short shifts.

In 2010 the TLEP grants phased out. Due to a decrease in manpower, the division could no longer dedicate a car solely to traffic enforcement. The traffic unit was shelved and the officers assigned to the traffic unit were detailed to handle calls and other traditional patrol duties. Understanding the need to address roadway safety, each shift sergeant assigns officers to directed patrols. Directed patrols target specific traffic problems in specific areas. Though sergeants attempt to utilize this strategy daily, it often means putting non-emergency calls on hold and there are times when call volume prohibits officers from completing traffic enforcement duties.



HONORS & AWARDS

CHIEF'S CHALLENGE

In 2002, the "Chief's Challenge" was introduced to the DeKalb Police Department. This program rewards officers for enforcing quality traffic violations in the community by placing a point value to a traffic citation. A quality traffic citation is one that promotes public safety when enforced by patrol officers. An example of a quality traffic arrest includes; Driving Under the Influence, Reckless Driving, Drag Racing, Illegal Transportation of Alcohol, Driving While License is Suspended or Revoked and Failing to wear a Seatbelt or Improper use of Child Restraint Systems. After attaining a certain amount of points, the officer is awarded a plaque commending their performance, as well as a letter in their personnel file. A second level of points earns the plaque, letter and three to five days of specialized training. A third and highest level of points earns the plaque, letter and up to two weeks of specialized training. The officer with the most points also gets their name placed on a plaque kept at the police department.

In 2010, there were five officers who met or exceeded the points necessary to be recognized in the Chief's Challenge. The Chief's Challenge is a program that values hard work done by officers who enforce quality traffic arrests. The overall winner this year is Officer Brian Bollow. Other officers awarded were: Officer Geoffrey Guzinski, Officer Phillip Brown, Corporal Scott Farrell and Officer Keunte Mallett.

DUI ENFORCEMENT REGONITION

In November of 2006, the DeKalb Police Department began to participate in a program through the Illinois Department of Transportation which recognizes officers who make 25, 50, 75, 100 and 200 DUI arrests. The program started January of 2001. The following officers are recognized for making DUI arrests – reflecting their totals since 2001.

HONORS & AWARDS

PATROL DIVISION EXEMPLARY PERFORMANCE RECOGNITION:

The police department also recognizes officers that exhibit high performance in a variety of functions. In 2010, the following recognition letters were awarded:

- **Exemplary Traffic Enforcement:** for officers who exceed in traffic enforcement categories; specifically, writing 300 or more traffic citations in a calendar year (an average of 25 per month, where the majority of citations are for moving violations). *Officer Brian Bollow, 452 traffic citations.*
- **Exemplary Parking Enforcement:** for officers who exceed in parking enforcement; specifically, writing 500 or more parking citations in a calendar year. *Officer Brian Bollow – 4064 tickets; Officer Lance Reinbolz – 1365 tickets; Officer Phil Brown – 852 tickets; Officer Darrick Wesson – 654 tickets; Officer Jessica Duehning – 607 tickets.*
- **Exemplary DUI Enforcement:** for officers who excel in DUI detection and arrest; specifically, arresting 20 or more DUI and/or Zero Tolerance violations in a calendar year. *Officer Geoff Guzinski – 20 arrests.*
- **Exemplary Criminal Enforcement:** for officers who excel in investigating crimes and taking appropriate enforcement action; and who actively attempt apprehension of persons wanted on warrants; and who effectively enforce city ordinance violations. *Officer Brian Bollow - .97 arrests per day; Officer Jessica Duehning - .83 arrests per day; Officer Geoff Guzinski - .83 arrests per day; Officer Phil Brown - .77 arrests per day; Officer Aaron Gates - .75 arrests per day; Officer Keunte Mallet - .71 arrests per day.*
*These represent the officers that were more than 50% above the average number of daily arrests. Since Officer Bollow was eligible for three separate letters of recognition, he also received a plaque commending him for his overall exemplary enforcement efforts.

"Giving So Much More..."

The DeKalb FFA and DHS After School Sewing recently met in the sewing lab to sew, cut and tie fleece blankets for a new program with the DeKalb Police Department. "Giving Sew Much More" is a community service project that will address the needs of young children during domestic issues in DeKalb.

An idea from Joan Jones (mother of DHS agricultural teacher Mark Jones), of Sycamore, developed into this after-school project at DeKalb High School. The fleece material is purchased locally and sewn and tied into small blankets that will be stored in police vehicles. These "security blankets" will be distributed by the police officers when small children are involved in domestic disturbance calls. The purpose of the program is to give children something to hold during a difficult situation.

Twelve students worked for three hours to sew 17 blankets during their first meeting. More material has been purchased with more meetings planned this spring. Donations are welcome for the project. At this point the FFA program has funded the materials for the "Giving Sew Much More" blanket project, but welcomes cash donations and/or one to three yard pieces of various print and solid fleece fabric pieces.



DeKalb Moose Donates ...

Representatives from the DeKalb Moose Club, an international fraternal and service organization, presented the DeKalb Police Department with stuffed animals designed to relieve stress for children in emergency situations.

The plush moose is given out to children to help in diffusing crisis situations.

Grants Received ...

The DeKalb County Community Foundation presented the DeKalb Police Department with a \$10,170 grant. This grant went towards the purchase two squad car laptops.

The Sigma Alpha Mu at NIU presented the department with \$1000 raised by the fraternity. This money allowed the department to purchase two laptop computers.



TRAINING

In 2010, officers participated in a variety of training. Several topics were specifically emphasized, and numerous re-certifications were completed. Officers continue to be involved in continuing education to be aware of changing laws and criminal code updates.

The department is a member of the Northern Illinois Training Advisory Board based in Rockford, IL. This state law enforcement training agency covers DeKalb, Boone, and Winnebago counties. The police department also regularly trains with the Illinois Valley Crime Prevention Commission in LaSalle County, and occasionally participates in training offered through the Suburban Law Enforcement Academy at the College of DuPage and the North East Multi-Regional Training Board based in North Aurora. Being able to train with various police agencies in the region allows officers to interact with officers from neighboring departments. This combined training effort helps ensure cooperation and unified response to incidents and disasters.

Training in gang awareness and identification, drug interdiction, human trafficking, counter terrorism, and computer crimes was an area of focus in 2010, with numerous officers attending training classes and seminars in these topics. Emphasizing the investigation of these matters has become paramount in modern times. Keeping our community protected from these types of crime has clear benefits to security and quality of life.

A number of officers participated in legal update seminars, including information about new and changed criminal and traffic laws. Specific legal matters were topics of other classes, such as rules of search and seizure, civil liability, juvenile procedures, and sex offender registration updates. Keeping officers current in federal and state statutes, case law, and legal procedures maintains the integrity of criminal investigations.

The police department also renewed its emphasis on officer safety in operational and physical skills. Several officers attended classes relating to traffic stop safety, suspect apprehension, rapid response, control tactics, and surviving edged weapons. To keep officers sharp with the use and accuracy of rifles, the department recertified with the AR-15 carbine.

In continuing its efforts to deter drunk driving, the department had two officers receive their initial certification as a breathalyzer operator. Several other officers renewed their certifications in field sobriety and breath alcohol testing. Advanced training in DUI enforcement and traffic crash investigation was also completed by several officers.

Community relations training is also an area of importance. Several supervisors and officers attended an Undoing Racism seminar, while others participated in personal improvement exercises such as motivational leadership, professional development, and stress management. Three officers are also currently pursuing Master's degrees in Public Administration at Northern Illinois University.













DUI ENFORCEMENT


The DeKalb Police Department remains vigilant in their enforcement of DUI arrests. The following graphs display a breakdown of information on DUI arrests in 2010.

- There were 133 DUI arrests in 2010 compared to 180 in 2009.
- Most DUIs were issued on Saturdays.
- Of the 133 DUI arrests 104 were male and 29 were females.
- Average age for a DUI in the City of DeKalb in 2010 is 29.6.
- 23 year olds had the most DUIs.
- In 2010, 87 DUI arrests resulted from routine patrol; 5 from traffic complaints; 38 from accidents; 2 from directed patrol; and 1 from radar.

DUI ARRESTS BY YEAR




DUI ARRESTS BY DAY OF WEEK





VIOLENT CRIME TREND




PROPERTY CRIME TREND









Programs...



CHAPLAIN

The DeKalb Police Chaplain program was developed to provide better service to the citizens of DeKalb as well as department personnel in times of personal crisis. Currently, the Chaplain is Father Ken Anderson of St. Mary's Church and Pastor Efrain Avila of the Kingston United Methodist Church and Wesleyan Church of DeKalb.

The Chaplain volunteers his/her time to provide spiritual guidance and counseling to all members of the DeKalb Police Department, their families, as well as citizens when it is needed.

The Chaplain may be called on to assist police officers in a variety of situations, including but not restricted to:

- Death notices
- Accidents involving serious injury
- Marital problems
- Persons simply wanting to talk over problems
- Alcoholics
- Stranded persons in need of financial help for travel
- Persons in need of food, shelter or medical services
- Assist in quieting upset persons or persons being committed to the hospital
- Comfort to victims or families of victims in sexual offenses
- Assist police officers and the people they contact in any other function of the ministerial profession as requested

More pleasant duties include attending departmental social events. The Chaplain may periodically attend shift briefings and ride along with patrol officers.

Child Passenger Safety Seat

The DeKalb Police Department started the Child Passenger Safety Seat program in the summer of 2001. Five DeKalb officers are nationally certified Child Passenger Safety Seat Technicians. They are available to assist citizens in answering any questions they may have, as well as making sure:

- The child passenger seat is installed correctly;
- It has not been recalled;
- It meets safety standards;
- It is correct for your child.

In order to be certified, officers must attend a 32-hour class given by the NHTSA (National Highway Traffic Safety Administration) certified instructors. The training covered topics such as injury prevention, crash dynamics, federal safety standards, vehicle occupant protection systems, and the correct installation of child restraint systems.

During the year there were safety checkpoints conducted at various locations in DeKalb and throughout DeKalb County that the officers assisted with. The Police Department installed 134 car seats in 2010. IDOT has provided us a mini-grant to assist in paying for recertification of officers and safety checkpoints.

Citizen Speed Control

The Citizen Speed Control program uses citizens to monitor and record speeds of vehicles on their neighborhood streets. By establishing when speed problems occur, the police department can direct aggressive enforcement in those areas and during those time periods.

On 7/21/01 this program was created in cooperation with the DeKalb County Partnership for a Safe, Active and Family Environment (DCP/SAFE) and the Safe Communities Task Force (an action group of DCP/SAFE) and funded with the help of the Illinois Department of Transportation.

Allowing citizens to record a vehicle speed with a radar unit helps to educate them on speed laws, radar, and the limits of police enforcement. The program assists the police department in identifying the top optimum times for directed traffic enforcement and it will also alert drivers that their actions will be monitored by our citizens. The citizens record the license plate number and relay that information to the police department. The police department then notifies the registered owner of the vehicle about the speeding violation.

Speed limits are established with the safety of both residents and motorists in mind. The purpose of this program is to reduce incidents of speeding vehicles on neighborhood streets and increase traffic safety awareness of citizens through Community Oriented Policing Strategies and community problem solving.

Citizens who are concerned with speed vehicles in their neighborhood may volunteer to participate in the program by contacting the DeKalb Police Department.

Community Policing Volunteers

The police department uses non-sworn citizen volunteers to perform various community service functions. The program provides citizens the opportunity to learn about and assist in community policing initiatives and law enforcement activities, and it serves to accomplish various tasks by way of civilian assistance. The volunteer program is an example of the department's mission to partner with the community to carry out public safety objectives.

The Community Policing Volunteers assist the Patrol Division with various clerical and administrative tasks, provide general assistance to officers, book prisoners, and assist with crowd control, directing traffic, and foot patrol during special events. Volunteers manned the front desk in the evening during the records room and radio room renovation.

Volunteers also assisted in various community service projects in 2010. Among the services provided were: reporting street lights out, marking abandoned vehicles, opening vehicles for locked out motorists, conducting bicycle registration events, assisting with security at high school events, and performing after hours business checks.

Some volunteers participate in the program to complement their college criminal justice coursework; others are community-minded citizens that wish to be actively involved in public service. The volunteers logged over 1380 hours of service in 2010, the most hours ever in the history of the program. This year marked the twentieth year of the program.

The Community Policing Volunteer program is a registered member of the National Volunteers in Police Service (VIPS) program. The volunteer program is a component of the Patrol Division and is coordinated by Sgt. Leverton.

Crime Prevention

During 2010, the DeKalb Police Department provides various programs for the citizens and businesses of DeKalb. The DeKalb Police Department also serves as a resource for both students of DeKalb, Kishwaukee College and NIU.

This past year Detective Angel Reyes spoke to local businesses, banks, neighborhood watch groups and NIU groups on topics such as Robbery, Bad Checks, Identity Theft, Frauds and Scams.

Officer Keith Ehrke & Officer Mott spoke to numerous groups about Gangs and Gang Violence.

Detective Aaron Lockhart and Officer Jaques provided various informational programs for the school district on topics such as Drugs & Alcohol, DUI, Stranger Danger and Violence Prevention.

DUI Day

Every two years Juniors and Seniors at DeKalb High School participate in a realistic, simulated live accident designed to personalize the grim cost of drinking and driving. Sirens ring as police and ambulances race to the scene and helicopters rush victims to the hospital. The cause of the accident: teenage drinking and driving.

The one-day program begins with the simulation of an accident. In the scenario, two cars full of teenagers are on their way to the prom. They were drinking and driving. At the scene, a teenager's dead body is hanging out of one car and others are injured. There is hysteria and chaos. Emergency personnel are called and arrive with sirens blaring. The scene becomes more chaotic as media and on-lookers arrive. The teenagers are devastated and hysterical that this actually happened to them.

Fire personnel attend to the injured and the drunk driver. The driver is put through field sobriety tests and arrested at the scene for DUI. Police officers also deal with the media and on-lookers. The driver is then taken to the simulated police department where s/he is questioned and booked. The Coroner is called to the scene.

A simulated hospital emergency room is set up awaiting the injured. Doctors and nurses attend to the injured and talk to the parents of the dead and injured.

The students then listen to statements from the police, fire department personnel, and hospital personnel of their experiences and consequences of driving under the influence. Students also recite poems and/or relate their personal experiences of such an incident.

Field Training

The Field Training Program is designed to prepare new officers to perform the essential duties of a police officer and to enhance the professionalism of the department through a contemporary, vigorous training system. The goal of the program is to produce a self-reliant police officer who is trained to modern professional law enforcement standards.

The training is structured as a four phase, 14-week program that prepares new officers in the various aspects of police work. The trainee rotates between three different Field Training Officers (FTO's) during the 14-week program. The FTO's provide a link between the Basic Law Enforcement Academy curriculum and the police performance expectations of the community and the department. The trainee also completes a week of training in the Investigation Division upon successful completion of training in the Patrol Division. The trainee also spends time working with the telecommunicators, and the School Resource Officer.

The trainees are oriented to the department and given instruction in city and county geography and jurisdictional boundaries. They are taught radio procedures, vehicle operation, traffic-related enforcement duties, accident investigation, search & seizure guidelines, arrest procedures, criminal investigation techniques, DUI enforcement, juvenile procedures, medical assistance services, court procedures, and complete instruction in city ordinances and department policy. There is also instruction in the topics of community policing and ethnic diversity. The trainee interacts with other area law enforcement agencies and becomes familiar with the Northern Illinois University campus.

The training involves detailed documentation and an intensive review process. The program has proven to be effective in providing assistance, education, and training to newly-hired police officers

A component of the FTO program is to provide refresher training to officers who have been inactive in the Patrol Division due to reassignment or injury. This forty to eighty-hour training is designed to re-orient officers back to patrol operations and educate them on any procedural or legal changes. In 2010, four officers completed FTO retrainers.

Gangs

The DeKalb Police Department responded to several serious gang related incidents in 2010. These incidents included three gang related shootings, aggravated batteries and robberies. The DeKalb Police Department investigated other gang related crimes throughout the year which included narcotic distribution, weapon offenses, fights, battery, criminal damage, disorderly conduct, and criminal defacement (graffiti).

The DeKalb Police Department continues to work closely with the DeKalb School District. Gangs continue to be active in recruiting young members in the community and schools. Therefore, it is important that the police department and the schools to continue to work together and demonstrate vigilance in combating the spread of street gangs throughout our community.

The DeKalb Police Department continues to work with other law enforcement agencies to identify new gangs and gang members. As gangs migrate into our community from other larger cities, it is important to communicate with the larger city police departments. The DeKalb Police Department gang unit attends gang meetings with other law enforcement agencies from Chicago, Aurora, Elgin, Rockford, and with smaller agencies in between. The DeKalb Police Department host monthly gang meetings for the different agencies in DeKalb County. The DeKalb Police department participates in the Northwest Illinois Gang Intelligence Group. This group focuses on the continued sharing of intelligence between multiple jurisdictions and will benefit our community by sharing the resources of many other communities that are experiencing similar challenges in combating gang related crimes.

The DeKalb Police Department is seeing new types of gang related crimes on the internet. Gang members are spreading their message and furthering the interest of the gang through the internet. Gangs are using the internet to display the signs and symbols of their gang as well as posting messages or symbols that are used to disrespect a rival gang. The use of these web sites can have a far reaching benefit for the gangs.

The DeKalb Police Department continues its outreach program to the community and does presentations for any group that request assistance on street gangs, drugs, and other related topics. By informing the community as to the wide range of problems caused by gangs, we gain allies in our fight against the spread of gangs. Through a cooperative effort, the police and community can have a significant impact on youth and attain a goal of reducing gang incidents and gang violence. In 2010 the DeKalb Police conducted four gang presentations to the different organizations in our community.

The gang unit is comprised of two officers who are assigned to the Investigation Division. Their duties include the following: overt patrol tactics designed for crime prevention and intervention, criminal intelligence, surveillance activities, diversion techniques to prevent juvenile involvement in gang activity, gang presentations to community groups, gang awareness training to school officials and parents, and follow-up gang related investigations. The goal of this unit is to utilize techniques to formulate a multi-faceted approach to identification, investigation, and prosecution of the gang members and their gangs that continue to commit crimes in our community.

The gang unit and members of this department have identified 54 different gangs/groups who have been either living in or visiting DeKalb. There are 362 gang members and 151 of their associates have come in contact with the DeKalb Police Department since March of 2008. 302 of those gang members and their associates stated that they have a local address in DeKalb.

G.R.E.A.T.

The G.R.E.A.T. (Gang Resistance Education and Training) Program is a school-based, law enforcement officer-instructed classroom curriculum with a focus on prevention of delinquency, youth violence, and gang membership. The G.R.E.A.T. middle school curriculum was designed for middle school entry-level students and is taught to the 6th grade at both Clinton Rosette and Huntley Middle schools. The violence prevention curriculum is a life-skills competency program designed to provide students with the skills they need to avoid gang pressure and youth violence, while developing a positive relationship among law enforcement, families, and the community. The program was developed through a grant from the U.S. Department of Justice.

Currently there is only one officer trained in the curriculum. He works in both middle schools teaching throughout the school year. There were approximately 414 students who graduated in 2010.

Honor Guard

The DeKalb Police Department Honor Guard was formed in 1996 for the dedication of Moudy Park. The Honor Guard continues to participate in the Moudy Park ceremony annually.

The Honor Guard participates in other events as well. They have been in parades, Mayoral Inaugurations, and at funerals. Members of the Honor Guard are also members of a multijurisdictional color guard made up of officers from the DeKalb County Sheriff's Department, NIU Police Department and Sycamore Police Department.

The Honor Guard is coordinated by Officer Jaques. Other members of the DeKalb Police Department Honor Guard are Officers Johnson, Wesson, Busby, Rodriguez, Zenzen, Reynolds, and Brown.

National Night Out

National Night Out is “America’s Night out against Crime.” The 27th annual National Night Out (NNO), a community education event sponsored by the National Association of Town Watch (NATW), was held on Tuesday, August 3rd, 2010.

In 2010, the National Night Out campaign involved citizens, civic groups, neighborhood groups, local businesses and members from police and fire departments from over 15,000 communities from all 50 states, U.S. territories, Canadian cities and military bases worldwide.

A car seat was given away due thanks to a combined donation from Target of DeKalb and our Police Benevolent and Protective Association Unit #71.

The event was held at the Target store. The departments involved were the DeKalb Police Department, DeKalb Fire Department, DeKalb County Sheriff’s Department, Sycamore Police Department, Cortland Police Department and the Cortland Fire Department. There were several police vehicles on display including squad cars, a police motorcycle, a police bicycle, and a mobile command center. Child safety seat technicians were on hand for car seat inspections, and the DeKalb Fire Department and Cortland Fire Department volunteered their time to staff the always popular simulated fire house. As usual, the K-9 demonstrations by the DeKalb Police Department and DeKalb County Sheriff’s Department were held throughout the event. Water, soda, cotton candy, hot dogs and other various food items were donated by Target. Worldwide, over 37 million people participated in National Night Out 2010.



Neighborhood Foot Patrol

The Neighborhood Foot Patrol program was introduced to the Patrol Division in 2002. Officers were encouraged to get out of their squad cars and walk through neighborhoods to meet residents and find out what problems there might be. Officers would stop their squad cars and walk the town. That year officers logged almost 200 hours in the neighborhoods. The program was well received by residents.

In 2010, individual officers were assigned to certain areas of town and logged almost 900 hours of time walking neighborhoods. The goals of the program are simple. The program is designed to:

- get officers more familiar with a particular area and the people who live there as well as getting residents familiar with the particular officers assigned to their area;
- create dialogue between officer and residents once they become comfortable interacting;
- discover what the problems of the neighborhood are and finding solutions to those problems;
- last but certainly not least, we want the residents to feel safe in their neighborhoods.

These goals are being met daily and to date, officers on foot patrol have also enforced criminal law, made other types of ordinance arrests, and there has been an occasional traffic arrest. Citizens of DeKalb are encouraged to talk to officers walking in their neighborhoods. The DeKalb Police Department wants to hear how we can help to better serve the neighborhoods.

Neighborhood Watch

The Neighborhood Watch program works by showing residents they are not powerless against crime. It does this through crime-prevention training, victim assistance, citizen patrols, phone trees and improving the overall condition of their neighborhood.

One of the main purposes of the neighborhood watch group is to get to know your neighbors. Neighborhood Watch groups do this by holding meetings, block parties, cookouts, etc. Officers often come to these meetings to speak about preventive measures residents can take to remain safe.

Residents observe their neighborhood for suspicious activity and report it to the police department. After reporting the activity to the police department, residents are encouraged to utilize the phone tree they set up to spread the information to other members of their group.

In 2010, the Historical District neighborhood formed a new neighborhood watch group. They had two meetings in which a large number of residents attended.

With the addition of these neighborhood watch groups, the City of DeKalb now has six active neighborhood watch groups that hold frequent meetings.

Resident Officer

The DeKalb Police Department in partnership with the Housing Authority of the County of DeKalb initiated a Resident Officer program at Lewis Court Apartments. The program, approved by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), has been successful at other HUD properties across the country.

Officer Quist was selected to be the “resident officer” and moved into the complex in November 2004. The program allows the officer to live at the complex rent free, paying only utilities. Officer Quist is also provided with a take-home squad car to increase police visibility not only at the complex but in the surrounding Pleasant Street/Lewis Street neighborhoods.

The goal of the Resident Officer program is to eliminate problems caused by visitors and unauthorized boarders at the low-income apartment complex. Children in the neighborhood will have an excellent role model to help influence their development in positive ways. It is our desire that neighbors in need of law enforcement support will view Officer Quist as a neighbor who is approachable and available to assist with their law enforcement needs. Officer Quist is a 25 year veteran of the DeKalb Police Department who is knowledgeable about city and community services. We see him as an excellent resource for citizens in the area for their individual needs and a proactive problem solver for neighborhood issues. Officer Quist also serves as the police department liaison to the Pleasant Street Neighborhood Association.

School Resource Officer

The School Resource Officer program is a cooperative effort between the DeKalb Police Department and the DeKalb School District. Det. Lockhart and Officer Jaques work together and serve as the DeKalb Police Department School Resource Officers (SRO). They are sworn police officers assigned to the DeKalb High School, Huntley Jr. High and Clinton Rosette. Officer Jaques is assigned to this duty full time and primarily works at the junior highs and Det. Lockhart primarily works at the DeKalb High School.

The School Resource officer serves as a teacher, counselor, role model, and advocate for students, families, faculty and staff. The SRO is not the school disciplinarian, nor does he perform any other staff function. He brings full service, personalized policing to an important segment of our community. With a full-time presence in the schools, he is an easily recognized and approachable resource for students.

The SROs presence demonstrates the officer's commitment to the students and tends to strengthen the student/police bond. This also demonstrates the police department's willingness to go beyond the normal tour of duty for the safety and interest of the students.

The goals of the SRO are:

1. Provide students, faculty and staff the opportunity to meet and interact with a police officer in a non-confrontational setting.
2. To act as a deterrent to crime in the school buildings, on campus, and in the community surrounding the school not only through uniformed presence, but also by developing positive relationships with students, faculty, staff, and community members.
3. To provide for the safety and security of the school's students, faculty, staff and visitors.

The SRO is under the direct supervision of the Criminal Investigation Lieutenant. He also works closely with the principals, dean of students, and school security officers.

Take Home Car

The Take-Home Car program allows for marked police cars to be stationed throughout the City of DeKalb. Though police cars cannot be used for personal use, the program gives the police higher visibility. It also puts an officer in a position to handle situations that arise on their way to and from work or court. When the budget allows for the purchase of new squad cars, the best used squad car is turned over to a police officer as a take-home car. The program calls for resident officers to be assigned the cars first. Other cars are assigned based on areas of high traffic complaints. There are currently five officers with marked take-home police cars.

TIPS

In November 2003 the police department was approached by the Ben Gordon Mental Health Center regarding a grant they received from the Department of Juvenile Justice. The grant was to be used in an effort to curb alcohol related incidents involving underage violators.

Cpl. Biarnesen was selected to administer the project. He was sent to several training lectures as well as a 40-hour Illinois State Certification class to enable the department to conduct compliance checks.

The department elected to implement four types of compliance checks:

- Standard Bar Check. Uniformed officers enter an establishment and conduct identification checks in an effort to locate underage violators.
- Standard Business Check. Underage agents are used and selected by Cpl. Biarnesen. The agents must not have a criminal record due to the fact they may have to testify in court. The agents dress as though they were going out with friends. The department does not want the agents to look older than they are. The agents must have a state identification or driver's license that is red indicating they are under the age of 21. They are advised what to say while conducting a check. The agents are told not to lie when asked for an ID or age. They are to give the server their ID. The agents are not allowed to attempt to convince the server to sell them alcohol after being asked for an ID. The agents are then taken by officers to a local store to be age checked. This is to help determine what the average person believes the ages of the agents are. The opinion of 12 people is taken as they enter and exit the store. The agents are then taken by officers to the pre-determined locations to conduct the business checks.
- Shoulder Taps. Underage agents set up outside an establishment and attempt to have patrons buy alcohol for them.
- Street Sweeps. Officers patrol streets with a high volume of foot traffic looking for open container violations, as well as possession/consumption of alcohol by minors.

In 2010 alcohol enforcement continued to be a priority for the department. One of the continued goals of our department and the city is to train the establishments in our city on the state and city liquor laws and ordinances. Included in this enforcement is the TIPS program. This past year 11 TIPS classes were held with 113 servers, managers, and bartenders completed the course. Participants were instructed on proper and effective ways to deal with difficult patrons and responsible serving. The course included ideas to prevent problems and liability for their establishments and the individual server. The course included proper carding of patrons and acceptable forms of identification. This course will be a continuing effort in years to come to assure compliance with the city

Tobacco Compliance Checks

Being concerned with the instances of underage smoking, the DeKalb Police Department has performed tobacco compliance checks when possible for many years. In recent years, enforcement was stepped up. With grant monies disbursed through the Illinois Liquor Control Commission 36 venues were checked multiple times throughout 2009. The program called for DeKalb police officers to visit with all tobacco licensees in the City of DeKalb. The businesses were advised the police would be checking tobacco sales compliance throughout the year. They were given a packet of information on how to prevent the sales to minors and explanations of the law. On follow-up visits they were given posters to hang up and pins to wear letting customers know that the tobacco licensees would be checking identification for age before a tobacco sale. Using minors 15 to 17 years of age, the businesses were checked three times throughout the year to make sure they complied with laws prohibiting the sale of cigarettes to minors. Enforcement practices have been successful bringing the compliance rate from 80% in 2009 to 93% in 2010.

Noteworthy Cases...



ANTINETTE KELLER HOMICIDE

On 10/21/10 the DeKalb County Major Case Squad was activated to investigate the disappearance of NIU student Antinette Keller. Keller was reported missing to the NIU Police on 10/14/10. Investigators and officers from several agencies were contacted to assist with this investigation.

Possible human remains and personal property were found at a local park in a secluded area a few days after Keller was reported missing. The remains were burnt to a point where DNA analysis was required for identification.

Very few solid leads were present at the beginning of this investigation. Investigators began looking at known associates of Keller and at the same time investigate the possibility Keller was killed by a stranger in the park.

William "Billy" Curl was developed as a suspect early in the investigation. Curl fled the state and was subsequently located in Covington, Louisiana.

Curl was brought back to Illinois and charged with five counts of first degree murder, criminal sexual assault and arson.

A nationally recognized anthropologist was used to examine the human remains and told some of our investigators that this was one of the most complicated cases they have seen.



This case drew national media attention along with extensive coverage locally. Investigators followed up on nearly 400 leads and worked long days until an arrest was made.

DRUG INDUCED HOMICIDE ARREST

On 03-11-10 at 7:11am officers responded to the 300 block of Gurler St. for a subject not breathing. The subject was taken to Kishwaukee Hospital where he was pronounced deceased. A death investigation was initiated.

Witness statements and evidence at the victim's apartment indicated that the victim was a heroin user and had recently used heroin. The investigation revealed that the victim purchased heroin the previous day in Aurora.

The victim purchased the heroin from two individuals: Jerry W Steffey, 36 years of age, from Aurora and Guy F Gates, 21 years of age, from Aurora. Steffey and Gates arranged for the victim to purchase heroin from Krystal Davis, 24 years of age, from Aurora, in Aurora on 03-10-10.

On 03-31-10 warrants were issued for Steffey, Gates and Davis for drug induced homicide, Class X felony. Bond was set at \$500,000 for Gates and Davis and \$250,000 for Steffey.

On 04-04-10 Gates and Steffey were arrested in Aurora by the Aurora Police Department and Davis was arrested by the Illinois State Police in Oakbrook on 04-05-10.

The North Central Narcotics Task Force and Aurora Police Department's Special Operation Group assisted DeKalb Police Investigators with this investigation.

SHOOTING

On 05-02-10 at approximately 5:27 pm, officers responded to the 600 block of N. 10th St. for a report of shots fired. Officers spoke to several witnesses that heard gun shots near the corner of 10th and Shipman.

Officers located a witness that observed a person on foot shoot several times at another subject. The suspect was then seen getting into a dark color vehicle on Shipman.

A victim in this shooting was located at Kishwaukee Hospital a few minutes after the shooting. The victim sustained non-life threatening injuries.

On 05-05-10 the following subject was arrested and charged in this investigation;

Andres Mendez, 15 years of age, from DeKalb was charged with aggravated battery with a firearm, Class X felony. Mendez is being charged as an adult.

Later in the investigation, Adrian Lopez, 18 years of age, from Sycamore was arrested in connection to the shooting.


Lopez is believed to be the driver of a car that transported Andres Mendez, 15 years of age, from DeKalb, to the area of the shooting and then transported Mendez away from the scene after Mendez fired several shots at the victim, striking him twice.

**ARMED ROBBERY ARRESTS**

The DeKalb Police Department arrested two people in connection to a robbery at Associated Bank, 1325 Sycamore Rd. on 11-11-09.

On 11-11-09 at 11:34 am, two suspects entered the bank armed with guns and demanded money from a bank employee. The offenders fled the area with an undisclosed amount of currency. No injuries were reported.

Evidence from the robbery was recovered several blocks away from the bank that the suspects discarded while fleeing the area. Items recovered include a semi auto gun and clothing. Evidence was sent to the Illinois State Crime Lab for DNA analysis.



DNA was found on the evidence and submitted to CODIS. The DNA sample matched a subject that was in CODIS. He was identified to be Eric Bernard, 26 years of age, from Chicago. Bernard is currently in Illinois Department of Corrections on unrelated charges.

Through further investigation and additional interviews, investigators identified Michael A King, 26 years of age, from Chicago Heights as the second suspect. On 04-29-10 King was picked up in Chicago Heights and brought to the DeKalb Police Department where he was subsequently charged with Armed Robbery, Class X felony.

Additionally, DeKalb Police arrested Jasmen M Cunningham, 22 years of age, from DeKalb. Cunningham was arrested on 04-29-10 in the 800 block of Russell Road and charged with armed robbery, Class X felony. Investigators learned that prior to the robbery Cunningham drove Bernard and King to the area of the robbery and transported one of the suspects out of town after the robbery.

AGGRAVATED ROBBERY

On 04-24-10 at 1:46 am, police officers responded to the 1300 block of Normal Road for a report of an altercation. Officers located five victims that reported they were beaten and robbed by several subjects.

Officers located the suspects in a vehicle at Hillcrest and Crayton Circle. Seven suspects were taken to the DeKalb Police Department for further investigation.

The victims reported they were walking in the 1300 block of Normal Road when they were attacked by several subjects. The victims were beaten and had personal property taken from them. The suspects fled the scene in a vehicle and were stopped a short distance away by police. Property taken from the victims was located in the suspect's vehicle. Four of the victims were transported to Kishwaukee Hospital with various injuries.

The following subjects were arrested and charged with 2 counts of robbery, Class 2 felonies and 5 counts of aggravated battery, Class 3 felonies;

- Demitri T Williams, 18 years of age, from Bartlett;
- Dion D Wallace, 17 years of age, from Roselle;
- Anthony W Lane, 22 years of age, from Glen Ellyn

Two juveniles were also charged with the same offenses and subsequently transported to JJC.

Joe L. McIntosh, 18 years of age, from Chicago was charged with obstructing justice, Class 4 felony and was arrested on four FTA warrants out of DuPage County.

ARMED ROBBERY

On 03-04-10 at 9:00 p.m. an attempted robbery was reported in the parking lot at Burrito Loco at 185 W. Lincoln Hwy. The victim reported that she was sitting in her car eating when a man approached her car and struck the car window with a rifle. The man demanded property from the victim. The victim quickly backed out of a parking stall and exited the parking lot. As the victim drove away the suspect fired one shot at the car striking the passenger side door. The victim drove to a nearby gas station and called police. The victim was not injured.

A short time later a DeKalb County Sheriff's deputy stopped a vehicle at 12th and Davy St. The passenger in the vehicle exited with a rifle and fled on foot. The deputy pursued and caught the suspect a short distance away. The suspect was identified to be a 16 year old juvenile from DeKalb. A rifle was recovered near the juvenile. The vehicle fled the area and was located a short time later in Malta where a second suspect, Nicholas D. Leato, 19 years of age, from Malta was taken into custody. Evidence was found at the scene connecting the juvenile to the robbery.

The juvenile was subsequently charged with armed robbery and aggravated discharge of a firearm.

Leato was charged with possession of a weapon by a felon, Class 2 felony.



ARMED ROBBERY ARREST

The DeKalb Police Department arrested Raymundo Flores, 28 years of age, from Chicago. Flores is charged with two counts of robbery, class 2 felonies and unlawful restraint, class 4 felony.

Flores was charged in connection to a robbery at Joyeria Regalos Reyes located at 314 E. Lincoln Hwy. on 07-17-08.

Three suspects entered the store and bound the clerk with duct tape. They then removed over \$20,000.00 worth of merchandise. The suspects fled the area after the robbery in a maroon SUV.

Fingerprints at the scene linked Flores to the robbery. On 04-09-09 an arrest warrant was obtained for Flores. On 03-14-10 Flores was arrested in Chicago.

ARMED ROBBERY

On 01-02-10 at 1140 hours, an armed robbery was reported at 302 E. Lincoln Hwy, "153 Check Cashing."

The suspect entered the store with his face partially covered and implied he had a weapon. The suspect demanded money from the clerk and fled the scene on foot with an undisclosed amount of currency.

Witness statements and video surveillance produced evidence that indicated the suspect got into the passenger side of a vehicle in the 200 block of E. Lincoln Hwy.

A patrol officer located the suspect vehicle in the 800 block of Ridge Drive approximately an hour and a half after the robbery. The officer stopped a subject as he tried to get into the vehicle. A second suspect was located in an apartment in the 800 block of Ridge Drive.



The two suspects were identified to be Antonio Q Taylor, 27 years of age, from DeKalb and Marcellus G Taylor, 23 years of age, from DeKalb. Both were charged with aggravated robbery, Class 1 felonies.

AGGRAVATED BATTERY

On 02-28-10 at 9:16 pm, officers responded to the 800 block of Oak St. for a report of several people arguing in the street. Officers located two injured subjects that said they were jumped and beaten by several occupants of a residence in the 800 block of Oak St.

The two injured subjects said they were walking past the residence when an argument started with several people on the porch. A fight broke out after everyone shouted gang related insults.

The two injured subjects were transported to Kishwaukee Hospital with substantial injuries.

Six adults and two juveniles were detained after the incident and subsequently charged with the following:

- **Jonathon A Taylor**, 17 years of age, from DeKalb; aggravated battery, 2 counts, Class 3 felonies and mob action, Class 4 felony.
- **Manuel Sanchez**, 18 years of age, from Sycamore; aggravated battery, 2 counts, Class 3 felonies and mob action, Class 4 felony.
- **Gregory L Greer**, 17 years of age, from Sycamore; aggravated battery, 2 counts, Class 3 felonies and mob action, Class 4 felony.
- **Michael J Frazier**, 21 years of age, from DeKalb; Aggravated battery, 2 counts, Class 3 felony, mob action, Class 4 felony and unlawful contact with a street gang member.
- **Corey A Frazier**, 19 years of age, from DeKalb; aggravated battery, 2 counts, Class 3 felonies and mob action, Class 4 felony.
- **John J Rivera**, 17 years of age, from DeKalb; aggravated battery, 2 counts, Class 3 felonies and mob action, Class 4 felony.

ATTEMPTED CHILD ABDUCTION

On 09-18-10, two juveniles reported that a man approached them in a car and asked if they wanted a ride. The juvenile declined the ride and left the area. The incident occurred in the 2500 block of Sycamore Road.

On 09-27-10, a police officer located a vehicle that matched the description given by the two juveniles in the 1300 block of E. Lincoln Hwy. The vehicle was stopped and the driver was identified to be Tyler J Green, 26 years of age, from DeKalb.

A subsequent investigation led to the arrest of Tyler Green for 2 counts of attempted child abduction, Class 4 felonies.

AGGRAVATED BATTERY w/FIREARM

On 04-13-10 at 7:08 pm, officers responded to the 900 block of Crane Drive for a report of gun shots. Responding officers did not immediately locate any evidence of a shooting. While officers canvassed the area for witnesses our police department was notified that a victim of a shooting was at Kishwaukee Hospital.

Investigators learned that the victim sustained a single gunshot wound and drove himself to Kishwaukee Hospital. The victim's injuries were non- life threatening.

The investigation revealed that the victim and suspect began to argue at the University Village complex, 900 block of Crane Drive, just prior to the shooting. During the argument, the suspect produced a hand gun and fired one shot at the victim striking him in his pelvic region. The victim then drove himself to Kishwaukee Hospital. The suspect was last seen leaving the area in a vehicle.

Police located several witnesses to the shooting and subsequently identified the shooter as Kendall Rogers, 33 years of age, from DeKalb.

On 04-14-10 an arrest warrant was issued for Rogers; Aggravated battery with a firearm, Class X felony; Aggravated discharge of a firearm, Class 1 felony; and Unlawful possession of a weapon as a felon, Class 2 felony

During the course of the investigation it was learned that Rogers was in the Naperville area. DeKalb Police gang officers went to Naperville and located Rogers in the parking lot of a convenient store on Rt. 59. Rogers was arrested without incident. Naperville Police Officers assisted with the arrest.

During this investigation, two guns and approximately two pounds of cannabis were located and seized in an apartment at 1100 W. Lincoln Hwy. We anticipate making additional arrests.



CRIMINAL SEXUAL ASSAULT

On 09-16-10 a sexual assault was reported to the DeKalb Police Department. The victim reports she was sexually assaulted in the 400 block of Clifford Drive, Prairie Park.

The victim attended a party near the park where she met the suspect. The victim and suspect subsequently left the party together and walked to the suspect's car. The victim reports she was punched and sexually assaulted on the way to the suspect's car.

The victim sustained facial injuries during the attack that did not require medical attention.

The suspect was located on 09-17-10 in his car. He was identified to be Dustin K Anderson, 19 years of age, from DeKalb. Anderson was subsequently charged with two counts of criminal sexual assault, Class 1 felony and aggravated battery, Class 3 felony.

DISCHARGE OF FIREARM

On 03-23-10 at 2:35 pm, police officers responded to the 700 block of Russell Road for a report of gun shots.

Witnesses told officers they observed a subject fire one shot from a handgun towards a group of people walking nearby. Officers were unable to locate anyone that was injured. The gunman and most of the witnesses fled the area prior to the officer's arrival. A suspect was developed after locating and interviewing several witnesses.

The suspect was identified to be Michael T. Lewis Jr., 22 years of age, from DeKalb.



On 03-24-10 a warrant was issued for Lewis for aggravated discharge of a firearm, Class 1 felony. Bond was set at \$250,000.00

On 08-20-10 Lewis was arrested without incident in Chicago by the Chicago Police Department on the warrant issued in this case.

CHILD PORNOGRAPHY

On 07-23-10 a joint investigation with the Sycamore Police Department led to the arrest of Richard E Strobert, 50 years of age, from DeKalb for the following charges;

Aggravated Child Pornography, Class X Felonies, 9 counts

Aggravated Child Pornography, Class 2 Felonies, 9 counts

Possession of a Firearm without a FOID Card, 2 counts, Class A Misdemeanors

On 07-23-10 a search warrant was executed at Strobert's residence in DeKalb. Investigators seized computer equipment and storage media that contained several hundred images of child pornography.

DRUG ARRESTS

In the early morning hours of 12/9/10 the DeKalb Police Department concluded a five-month long investigation into illicit drug sales in DeKalb. The investigation resulted in the arrest of 12 subjects who are suspected of selling drugs. The execution of three search warrants were also conducted.

The following agencies assisted DeKalb Police with the early morning operation: Illinois State Police Narcotics Task Force, Illinois State Police Swat Team, US Marshal Service Fugitive Unit, DeKalb County Sheriff's Department, NIU Police Department and Sycamore Police Department.

Officers executed search warrants at: 520 Grove St.; 418 W. Hillcrest; and 822 ½ N. 13th St.

Recovered in the search warrants were drugs, money and a firearm.

Over the course of the investigation information was developed leading investigators to several individuals believed to be selling drugs. The drug transactions took place at various locations in DeKalb including residences, parking lots and businesses. A majority of the arrestees were known gang members.

Additional charges and arrests are pending. Additional charges were filed against five of the individuals arrested on Thursday, 12/9/10, during the DeKalb drug sweep: the additional charges stem from search warrants executed on 12/9/10 follow-up investigation during the drug sweep.
